Nursing Home Association, which on Tuesday charged that THE TRIBUNE and Better Government' Association disclosures of scandalous conditions in nursing homes were exaggerated and "politically motivated," last night "strongly endorsed" action being taken in response to the disclosures.

on Tuesday charged that official body has been designated to investigate, we wel-come its investigation and will work with it.

"If anything is found to be wrong, then those people [re-sponsible] should be dealt with. So far the charges have not been substantiated."

Official Body Named

Yampol identified the official investigative body with which the association pledges to work the General Assembly's Legislative Advisory Com-mittee to Public Aid, headed by State Sen. John W. Carroll Park Ridgel.

Chabot said last night that the association will support Gov. Ogilvie's call for an expanded inspection and consulta-

tion program, Mayor Daley's proposal for more effective employment controls and the proposed investigation by Carroll's committee. He also urged a central training program for nurse's aides

for the entire metropolitan area, a training program for medical technicians, and development of training films on long-term care to be available to nursing homes to show to employes.

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
