Nursing Home:

Lousy, Horrible

AND PAMELA ZERMAN Dr. Franklin Yoder, Illinois director of public health, made a surprise inspection of several Chicago nursing homes yesterday and described one of the homes as a "horrible, lousy

place." The state's top health official also amounced that state health inspectors will be per-manently assigned to Chicago within a week for the first

time. "We are no longer going to take the city's word for every-thing," said Yoder. "We are not going to discredit the city's inspections, but their reports nursing home conditions will only be part of our expanded program."

Gave License Automatically The state automatically has licensed Chicago nursing homes approved by city health inspectors. Yoder said rubberstamping based on city inspec-tions would end after inspectors from his 1,100-member staff in Springfield are assigned to Chicago. He suggested his office may seek "complete control" over nursing bome operations in Illinois.
