The first impression, after a careful reading of the Betty Wells series in The Eagle on Larned State Hospital is that patients, though not brutalized, are sometimes mistreated, and that there is a serious shortage of professional help for them.

The impression probably is ac-urate, and would also be true of the other state mental hospitals, as well as state institutions in general.

It is no secret that Larned State Hospital suffers from its geography, it is at a considerable remove from any sizeable psychiatric community, and professionals always have been reluctant to stay there for any protracted period.

If The Eagle's series does nothing else, it calls attention to the need for a thorough re-evaluation of the state's mental health facilities, with an eye to improvement.

Such an investigation ought to be the responsibility of the legis-lature, with all assistance from the Division of Institutional Management, which has the re-sponsibility for administering the hospitals. The assistance of such other experts—as Menninger Clinic officials would be most welcome.

Legislation has been introduced that would accomplish such an investigation of Larned State Hospital. It should be passed, though it might be in the best interests of the state if it were broadened at least to include the rest of the mental hospitals too.


